Healing with Forgiveness and Reconciliation -**Breaking the Cycle**

From Death to Life

Mary Johnson-Roy is the mother of a murdered child, and the founder of "From Death to Life", an organization dedicated to ending violence through facilitating healing and reconciliation between families on both sides of the tragedy of homicide. Through participation in the restorative justice process, Mary transformed the hatred she had for Oshea Israel, the 16-year-old boy who took her only son's life, into forgiveness and love. When Oshea was released from prison in 2010, after having served 17 years, Mary welcomed him home with open arms. She now considers him her "spiritual son" and together they share their powerful story of healing and reconciliation in forums around the country. Mary also leads the Two Mother's healing group, for mothers on both sides of the tragedy of homicide. She lives in Minneapolis, MN, with her husband Ed Roy.

Oshea Israel is a poet, songwriter, musician, public speaker, mentor, father, son, friend, advocate for peace and forgiveness, a product of reconciliation between victims and offenders, and most importantly, a man about change.
